Baseline Accessibility

- Parking Paved parking with reserved/marked accessible spaces.
- Curb cuts curb cuts should be present to/from parking, all walking paths, entries/exits, and areas of convening.
- Walkways walking paths, hallways, areas of required access should be well maintained, firm, stable, and barrier free; allowing participants, mobility aids, strollers to move without restriction.
- Restroom(s) At least one ADA compliant restroom is required.
- Sound sound system, portable PA, speaker; amplified sound required and should be used by all speakers and for all event announcements.
- Elevator and ramp access Elevators and/or ramps present to and from all relevant parking, meeting locations, event venues, restrooms
- Signage Text is written clear and concise, fonts/colors are high contrast.

WALK FOR PKE

The annual Walk for PKD is our signature fundraising and awareness event and the largest gathering of PKD patients, families, friends and supporters. The funds raised through the Walk for PKD belp us take strides towards reaching our goal to end PKD and ensure no one faces the disease alone. Each year nearly 50 inspiring events will occur in cities across the nation. The Walk is a family-oriented event that honors and supports loved ones, creates a sense of community, and provides hope for a better tomorrow. With your help, treatments and a cure are within reach.

WHAT IS PKD?

- > Polycystic kidney disease (PKD) is a chronic, genetic disease, causing uncontrolled growth of fluid-filled cysts in the kidneys often leading to kidney failure. It affects all gender, racial, and ethnic groups equally.
- > As the cysts accumulate more fluid, they get bigger and bigger, destroying healthy tissue, which leads to high blood pressure, other complications, and often kidney failure.
- > A typical kidney is the size of a human fist and weighs about a third of a pound. Polycystic kidneys can be much larger, some growing as large as a football. Kidneys can develop cysts ranging in size from as small as a pinhead to as large as a grapefruit.
- > There are two types of PKD, both are genetic: autosomal dominant (A DPKD) and autosomal recessive (ARPKD).
- > ADPKD is the more common type and affects more than 600,000 Americans and 12.4 million people worldwide.
- > ARPKD is a rare form of the disease that occurs in 1 in 25,000 children worldwide.
- > There is no cure. But there is hope.
